Pastor's Report

In our church life we seek to grow in faith, hope and love, that is, in spiritual formation, mission and belonging. This requires a re-orientation away from the emphases of our culture to God's priorities expressed in part in our Church Covenant.

An important aid in this is our corporate worship and I am grateful to those who assist in leading us; our Music Team and choir members; Gwyneth Smith, Shirley Tuckwell and David Mynard on the organ and piano; folk who creatively present Christian truths in the children's segments; and to Geoff Blackburn, Basil Brown, Dorothy Dullege, Keren McClelland, June Robertson and Lindsay Smith who have assisted with preaching.

Given the variety in our temperaments and learning styles there needs to be a range of approaches, and we have sought to accommodate this through the different teaching series such as Ken Manley's, "Preparing for the predictable: reflections on the life of David" and "Questions for Baptist Christians today"; reflective worship opportunities in the lead up to Easter; Howard, John and Janine Barclay's messages on Mission; as well as my series on Jeremiah, The Holy Spirit, Philippians, The Church and Genesis.

It has also been encouraging to see people growing in their faith through involvement in small groups. This year these have covered Proverbs, Spiritual Gifts, Philippians, Discovering Jesus, Prayer, Evangelism, New

Testament Overview, the Five Love Languages, Ephesians, The Trinity, John's Gospel, plus another Alpha Group, and Baptism and Church Membership classes, with seven young adults following Christ's example.

The second dimension, hope, has to do with our outward focus - sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ.

We see it not only in outreach through our Possums Playgroups and kindergarten, University Student Hostel and Karana aged care community, but in individual lives in our extended families, neighbourhood and places of work, study and leisure. Again this year there have been special initiatives through Children's and Hostel Services, parenting seminars, the Family Fair and Fun Day, Sunday School, Youth Group, Chat and Chew, Ladies Evening Fellowship, Drop In, as well as initiatives with the Kew Regional Ministry, the annual World Day of Prayer, and at Christmas and Easter in conjunction with the Kew Inter-Church Council.

There has also been growth in our Missionary Family with the addition of Les and Cathy Sherwen serving in China with Global interAction and John and Janine Barclay in India with Interserve, and our ongoing support for Lisa Detlefsen (Wycliffe Bible Translators at Ukarumpah), Mary Edgar (Interserve - Nepal), Allan and Merryl Gamble (Service Fellowship International - Bandung), Grace Munro (Global interAction Publications), Michelle Stancliffe (Youth With a Mission), and Cynthia Page, Chaplain at Kew High School.

Planning is well underway for the Franklin Graham Festival to be held at the Telstra Dome on March 18, 19 and 20 next year, with Christian Life and Witness classes on November 11, 18, 25 and December 2 providing an excellent opportunity for us to be further equipped in evangelism and discipleship.

In relation to the third area, opportunities to connect with and grow in love for one another have continued to expand this year through the Church hospitality lunches, Musical Soiree, Cup Day Picnic, Youth Group, Alpha and Church Camps, Music Conference, and the prayer and care notes in the church bulletin each week.

With two day-time and six evening Bible Study groups now running on a weekly, or fortnightly basis, plus four prayer meetings each week, the possibility of everyone being involved in a small group is being increasingly realised.

In all this I am grateful to God for the support of our Deacons, together with the Ministry Team: Chris and Janine de Paiva, Tuan and Hannah Huynh, Keren and Gwyn McClelland, Miriam and Louis Schmidt, Kingsley and Gwyneth Smith, Gillian Tonson, and Liz, Kerryn, Tanya and Natalie Pell.

Although there have been times of pain as a result of sexual abuse in the history of the church, it has been encouraging to see God's Spirit at work in people's lives and a willingness to work through issues and develop procedures for handling concerns, as we seek to bring all areas of life under the Lordship of Jesus Christ.

Can I encourage you to read these reports with an openness to which ministry group you might be part of to facilitate your growth in spiritual formation, mission and belonging.

The two NightChurch baptism services (Elise and Cameron Taylor, Kim Fleming, Kylie Geelan and Luke Gibbons) were real highlights during 2004.

Kim Fleming and Ellen McNaught led a great workshop on service leading in May 2004. There are about 15 service leaders who take on an exciting, but not always appreciated job (sometimes the only feedback you get is if something goes not quite to plan)! Some of the worship has included skits, songs, alternative prayer, listening, silence, candles and responsive prayers. At Kew, every member is a minister and therefore service leading is a real way to contribute to our worship and learning. Thanks for your enthusiasm, creativity, prayerfulness and faithfulness in leading us in these times. May we support you better in the year ahead. New Service leaders are always appreciated.

It will be great to have two series on ethics and Luke's Gospel parables in the coming months.

Personal blessings and challenges

Pastoral care is a privilege of ministry here in the community at Kew Baptist Church. I am so encouraged by people working through difficult issues and remaining faithful in traveling the not always straightforward path following Jesus. I am so encouraged when uninvolved and fringe people have been better included, cared for and loved in an inclusive community.

The SWOT (strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats) reflections (July 2004) were valuable in seeing some common hopes, dreams and frustrations, as well as perceiving the huge diversity of us as a group. We noticed that the focus was on the 7pm service rather than on all the things throughout the week that make us a healthy community. In the year ahead I would love to see continued development of people who are responsible and creative not just in the 7pm service, but also in the areas of pastoral care, social events, communication and small groups. We need to continue to reiterate that our church is in the people, not the building Sunday night!

Working only 2 ½ days (and trying to keep it manageable with family, mission and other commitments) has meant lots of creative thinking: about speakers for the 7pm service and working on keeping up considerable amounts of people contact (not doing just doing office stuff!). Andrew Kollmorgen, Katie McGowan, Kim Fleming and Ellen McNaught (now in Adelaide) have supported me wonderfully throughout 2004 in the ministry support team. Thank-you you are amazing people.

Kew Regional Ministry

We hope to connect in better with Kew Regional Ministry and the work Natalie Dixon is involved in throughout Boroondara. Many contributed toiletries to the famous 'toothbrush' box this year and a few attended the community dances (and got a lot out of it!). In the year ahead we hope we can connect in better still with taking groups of people from the various boarding homes out for a coffee or to the movies, supporting the monthly service in the Uniting Church for people with intellectual and physical disabilities and attaching ourselves to a specific boarding house leading up to Christmas.

Social

Another missional opportunity to minister is in the hostel and university context. It is great working with Janine and Chris de Paiva and participating in joint NightChurch community (such as Passover and Olympic Social) and Hostel events. As the community grows in size it is harder to have impromptu social events, but we need to balance both organised and informal gatherings.

Thank you

The NightChurch community is not a separate event from the whole of KBC, in fact, the community benefits KBC as a whole by support in morning music, Sunday school, youth group, prayer, admin, camps, service leading, audio, small groups, missions, pastoral care and website... NightChurch members also give generously in the more universal 'church' through involvement in summer missions, camps, Kew Regional Ministry... and just living with faith in the place that God has them right now... loving God and loving neighbour. Keep up the good work.

Thank you to those praying for this part of KBC and to the ministry team, deacons, and particularly Rod and Liz Pell who support the NightChurch community and Gwyn, Lydia, Geordie and me in *many different ways*.

As the NightChurch community continues to integrate faith at home, study, work, church and play... God grant us the energy, balance and love to do it with our whole beings!


Sunday Morning Pre-service Prayer Meeting

Karana Community

It is 45 years since the opening of Karana, and the church's interest in, and commitment to the facility, has been maintained through that time. During the past year I have been very grateful for that support, expressed in a variety of ways.

The pastors and others from the congregation assist with weekday chapel services and Sunday morning services and their ministry is greatly appreciated. On weekdays the average attendance at chapel is about 25 while 40 – 45 residents attend on Sundays. These are truly ecumenical gatherings with people from a variety of denominations glad to worship God together. Miss Phyl Taylor continues to co-ordinate the Sunday morning program. From very small beginnings at a time when it became clear that few people were no longer able to go out to church, the Sunday service has become central in the life of the community. The eighth anniversary will be held in September. Pastor Rod Pell, Miss Bev Smith and I meet with Phyl on a three monthly basis for support and encouragement in regard to the Sunday service.

Those residents who are still able to worship at Kew are grateful for the transport provided each Sunday.

A group of men from Karana have attended the monthly Chat & Chew lunches. To enable a larger number of people to share in this activity it is planned that several meetings each year will be held at 55 Walpole Street. The last year has seen an influx of men into High Care and they are looking forward to being present at the first Chat and Chew at Karana on 26 August.

Some ladies from the church maintain a link with Karana through the Fellowship Meeting which is held on 2nd Thursday of each month at 2.30pm. Others are very welcome to attend.

The church has faithfully provided pastoral care for residents associated with the church, and the pastors have willingly agreed to be "on call" at times when I have been on leave, responding to any urgent needs during my absence. Rev Kingsley Smith has commenced some pastoral visiting amongst the men at Karana.

Visitors to Karana consistently comment, "there is something different about this place". Although many things have changed through the 45 years – the buildings, the staff, the regulations under which we operate – God's amazing love continues to pervade this place. Please pray that people will encounter God here.

Mission Aid and Development Group

"To make known the love of God to the world".

The Kew Baptist Church Covenant says that we covenant before God and with each other to make known the love of God... to the world.

The M.A.D. Group has sought to do this, among other ways, through our missionary support. We have divided our budget allotment between eight of our mission representatives whose mission focus is overseas, as well as to eight church members studying theology and related studies locally.

We have used meeting times to write to our missionaries. It is hoped that our bright postcards and our words of encouragement have warmed their hearts.

It has been exciting to welcome four new members. But we need more – and with growing commitment.

To show God's love to the world, we need to know the needs of the world. So we saw a demonstration of Abdul's story. He is a fictional but typical person from the wider world. Most of Abdul's basic needs, pruned to the basic minimum, could fit on a coffee table. But to pay for these basic necessities, "Abdul's" income is less than \$2 a day. How many Abduls (\$2 a day people) are there in the world? Answer = 2000,000,000.

We were challenged to ask, *How many of these can we reach with God's love?* We saw that one very far-reaching way is through the Millennium Development Goals. In the year 2000 all 191 member nations of the United Nations pledged to work together To <u>halve world poverty by 2015</u>. In this election year, we have written To key members of our government to remind them of this pledge.

We have put on two mini-dramas. The first, called, *I was Thirsty,* focussed our attention on the International Year of Fresh Water. One of the actors held up a jar of filthy water and called out "... *over one billion people drink this stuff!*" Later that day, one loyal church member wrote a thank you letter to the M.A.D. Group and said that she could still not get out of her mind the sight of that filthy water which so many millions have to drink.

The second mini-drama sought to link Mothers Day with the Third World. It was called, *Mothers Day under the Bridge*, and it told something of the more than 40 families who live in cardboard shacks under a bridge in Delhi, India. What a challenge to show God's love!

In these and other ways, we have tried, in the words of the Kew Baptist Church Covenant to make God's love "... relevant to today's world ..."

Wider Baptist Connections

Baptists stress the importance of the local church. So here at Kew we are grateful for all that we experience as a part of Christ's Body here in our community. But whilst each local church is gifted and blessed to fulfill its unique ministry, we also realise that we are more than an independent and autonomous church body. We need other Christians in order fully to express our Christian mission and calling.

One way we do this is in our relations with other denominations here in Kew and in our city - but another special way is through our wider connections in the Baptist family of Christians. So Kew is a member church of the Baptist Union of Victoria. Thus we share with about 16,000 members and over 37,000 people who attend Baptist churches in our State. Each church sends delegates to meetings of the Union where significant decisions are made about our joint work and regular reports about what is happening in our churches are received. Together we support the work of our director of ministries (Alan Marr) and our regional ministers as well as in the boards that are responsible for our College, the Baptist schools, evangelism, youth work, insurances, social services etc - this is a large enterprise and we are grateful to be a part of Christ's mission through the Baptist Union of Victoria. Our delegates bring regular reports to the church of what is happening and all of us can read about it in our monthly Victorian Baptist Witness. But the Victorian Baptist Union is one member Union of the Baptist Union of Australia which has 956 churches and about 60,000 members. Mrs. Gwyn Milne of Victoria is our current President. Once again we work together on a national level, so we can support world mission (Global Interaction), or evangelism (Crossover Australia), world aid including the child sponsorship program in which many of us share. Yet there is more!

The Baptist Union of Australia is a member body of the Baptist World Alliance, formed in 1905 and so anticipating its centenary next year. Thus from our church we are apart of a world community of Baptists with over 180,000 churches and over 46 million members - probably a community of at least 00 million people. Kew has made a gift of \$1,000 and we are now a Global Impact Church of the BWA, which means we are a contributing church to the various programs of the BWA in evangelism, world relief, education, movements for freedom and justice around the world. The next Congress will be in Birmingham England next July. It would be great if others from our church would join Margaret and me as we plan to be there. I hope Kew can continue to be a global impact church through the BWA. So as we worship and serve here in Kew we remember that we are apart of a special family- in our state in our country and in the world. Those of us who are privileged to represent you - as delegates to the Union Assemblies or to the BUA or its member boards and to the BWA are grateful for your interest and support.
