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KBC LIFE AND MINISTRIES

PASTOR'S OVERVIEW

As a community of God's people our desire is to:

- grow in our relationship with God as we follow in the ways of Jesus;
- understand ourselves and others in the body of Christ, and develop the gifts His Spirit has given us;
- support each other in the different situations and circumstances in which He has called and placed us.

This year we have been blessed in the first area by the input of Ken Manley and Bill Leng as well as members of the preaching class and others in the congregation. In the morning services we have studied Hosea, Psalms, Church, Baptism and Communion, Luke, Philippians, Covenant, and John's Gospel; and at NightChurch, messages on James, reflections on overseas and summer missions, Luke, Revelation, Psalms and Barriers to Belief; as well as our special emphases during Advent and Lent.

Our small group study notes on *Jesus in Luke* and *Things that really matter: studies in Philippians*, have helped us explore and discuss in more detail issues raised in the sermons; and the variety of other groups such as *Introducing God*, *Sharing our Faith*, and the Baptist World Aid *50/50* studies on social justice have enabled people to start or continue on the journey according to their interests.

Liz Taylor's work in co-ordinating our small groups, encouraging our prayer life and developing one on one contacts between people has greatly enhanced opportunities for us to grow in our relationship with God and others, and an increasing number of people are taking advantage of times to pray with someone else before or after



services. The weekly prayer meetings, occasional extra prayer gatherings and creative prayer nights have provided opportunities along with regular times of prayer in the many small groups.

In relation to the second area, workshops on worship, parenting, leading small groups, mentoring and preaching have given opportunities for people to grow in their understanding of themselves and others and to develop the gifts His Spirit has given us. It has been encouraging to see initiatives such as the Possums Party expo, Highbury Grove street party, Camcare appeals, Carols at Petrie square, Good Grub, Carrical, camps, beach missions, coffee shops, summer soccer, youth ministry, friendship in the flats, and the Abbotsford house which have provided opportunities to relate to others as an outworking of God's love in our lives. Moreover, each of our day to day interactions with friends, family, fellow students, work colleagues, other retirees, and neighbours, remain significant places of connection and outreach.

In this regard, the third area – supporting each other in the situations in which God has placed us, is vital. For example, each year we have more folk involved in teaching, Christian Religious Education and chaplaincy in schools and universities and the commissioning of Dorothy Dullege and appointment of Rory Chambers with *ACCESS* Ministries has continued this trend. In addition, structured programs like the ministry of Possums to young families, our Sunday School, Junior and Senior youth groups, and outreach to university students through the Residence are significant, and we are grateful to Miriam Schmidt, Liz Pell, Steph Bowers and Stephen and Michelle Duke for their co-ordinating roles, Res support staff and residents of the House, and the many folk who give of their time each week in playgroups, teaching Sunday School classes, leading Bible studies and organising social events.

One of the things I like about KBC is our diversity:

- the spread of ages (0 95 at present)
- range of socio-economic backgrounds
- · variety of nationalities, and
- different ways of expressing our faith,

embody and reflect the Good News of Jesus Christ who breaks down dividing walls which so often separate people (Ephesians 2).

Over the last few months since my diagnosis with myeloma and particularly with the commencement of chemotherapy at the end of May we have been very conscious of the love and support shown by and between members of the KBC community. As a family we have been thoughtfully, generously and lovingly cared for by the church community and we are grateful for the many folk who have stepped up to take on

additional responsibilities, including other members of the pastoral team: Ken Manley as Acting Senior Pastor overseeing the preaching and life of the church; Grace Munro carrying an additional load coordinating pastoral care, alongside administration and baptism classes; Lindsay and Meryl Smith who have taken many funerals in addition to their regular pastoral contacts, Hymnfests, Pleasant Sunday Afternoons, maintenance of our properties, and the Bible study for young mums; Kingsley Smith for his ongoing leadership of the Sunday morning prayer meeting, monthly Chat and Chew luncheons for retired men, and contacts with a wide variety of people; Liz Taylor co-ordinating the Sunday School for six months in addition to organising our small groups, prayer and mentoring ministries; and our Interns — Steph Bowers, James Docking, Amy Hill and Andy Hunter — who facilitate our youth, music teams, and young adults ministries.



It's a joy to serve the Lord in such a diverse community of faith and we pray that His name will continue to be glorified and His Kingdom extended in all that we do.

In the coming year let's continue to grow in our relationships with God and others; use the gifts His Spirit has given us; and support each other in our personal and collective ministries in Melbourne and beyond.

VIETNAMESE CONGREGATION

Early on Sunday afternoons the KBC Vietnamese community gathers in the Church Hall for our worship time and then for a meal together. We have been fortunate to have various guest speakers come to lead us during this time when we do not have our own pastor. Rod Pell continues to offer his guidance and joins us from time to time when his health permits.

The young people meet for a Bible class at 11am on Sunday, and every Tuesday night at homes in the Western suburbs. Luan Walker has been active with the young people's ministry. The Adult Bible Study groups meet on Saturday evenings in people's homes in the Kew/Richmond areas. It has been very encouraging to have quite a few students from Vietnam participate in the community's life, and some of these are learning about Jesus for the first time through their interaction at KBC.

Since the beginning of this year, God has blessed us with about 10 new converts, some older folks as well as several young people. Ngoc Ha has been helping us with the baptism classes.

The music during our Sunday services has been a real blessing; we are growing this ministry and we look forward to some fundraising activities to add a set a of drums and a keyboard to encourage more young people in this wonderful ministry.

Khoi Doan continues to provide overall leadership as Secretary. During the past year Huong Do was appointed as Treasurer. Whereas previously the Vietnamese congregation's offerings were handled through the Church Office and the general accounts of KBC, we have now opened our own bank account and have set up separate financial processes.

We have been continuing to pray about our need for pastoral support of the congregation as a whole and of our young adults, and have had discussions about the possibility of making an appointment as soon as this becomes possible. We would love for the wider congregation to join us sometimes in our services; please feel free to come and join us on Sundays, especially the first in the month, where we can share in communion as well as a meal afterwards.

There are two main things which struck me when I attended a morning service following two months overseas and I think they sum up the whole year so well. There was excitement due to the growth in numbers of people attending, and there was energy and varied participation.

There has been anticipation watching the NightChurch community continue to grow numerically and spiritually, but also an element of uncertainty as the whole church banded together in prayer for our senior pastor, Rod Pell, as his health suffered some setbacks. It has been inspiring to receive feedback on the various ministries of the church from all the deacons, as they are each involved in a variety of different activities.

The whole church has benefited from the shared sermon series at the beginning of the school year, complete with small group studies. One overwhelmingly positive feedback received from the church meeting discussions has been appreciation of intergenerational mingling and sense of community these shared studies, now in their second year, have helped foster.

Church camp is always a time of meeting new people and forming deeper relationships with folk we may only see on a Sunday. While unfortunately I was unable to attend this year, all reports have been glowing with a large number of younger people attending, an answer to the faithful prayers of many in the congregation from 10 years ago. It has also been great in the NightChurch community to share with people exploring the gift of preaching, as Ken Manley led the preaching classes as a precursor for overseeing young adults preach on the book of Revelation.

Worship services are not the only focus of the deacons meetings, with general running of the church important to ensure that all activities are appropriately supported. It has been great to see maintenance improvements completed to the hall, in painting and upgraded toilets, as well as some safety changes made to the front entrance to the church. Many 'little' jobs which keep the building standing have been completed, thanks to the tireless work of Lindsay Smith and others. Working bees, for the Student Residence, the Possums group and also the church have seen some great interactions with people who do not necessarily attend the church services, but also big jobs completed where 'many hands make light work.'



The wider community has always been important and new expansions on initiatives such as the Friendship in the Flats are inspiring as we see God at work in many different ways. Ongoing outreaches such as Karana and Carrical continue to see relationships strengthened, as people are faithful to be where God has inspired them to serve.

CHAIRPERSON

We recognise that we are not the centre of all knowledge and that many ideas that have had a major effect on the life of the church have been put forward by people outside this group.

What do we hope to achieve?

We rely on God to give us direction and we have seen the results of His leading, particularly in the decision to employ the interns and Liz Taylor to support Rod.

The opportunity to employ Grace as administrator (30-hours a week) has added significantly to the smooth running of the church.

They have challenged us greatly, as have members of the preaching class led by Ken. We have heard from Chris Pickering, Taryn Atkinson, Renee Bazley, Michelle Edwards, Abrahm Gunn and Kez Pell. Thank you for your willingness to be used. Thanks too for the countless people who have been involved in curating the services, organising and playing music for the services, and for those on audio and data.

Small Groups: We also connect in a range of small groups throughout the week; *Ignitio'* led by Steve and Michelle Duke, *Romans* led by Steph Bowers, *Guidance* led by Chris and Janine de Paiva, *Faith and Culture* led by Andy Mitchell, *Visionary Lives* led by Jazlyn Langford with Kendra and Johnathan Shaw, *Celebration of Discipline* led by Irene Schuringa and Mark Payne and finally *Girls Brunches* organized Laura Strange and Steph Bowers. Although not strictly a small group, a topical based group has been meeting to discuss many different areas regarding *relationships*. We've been given free access to the community room on Wednesday nights, and it has been such a blessing to be out of the cold! We run a Bible study on every second Tuesday night, and although numbers are small and quite unpredictable, we really see that there is a hunger in people to study God's word. PRAYER

"If we don't know how or what to pray, it doesn't matter. God's Spirit does our praying in and for us, making prayer out of our wordless sighs, our aching groans." Romans 8:26 (The Message)

"Devote yourselves to prayer, being watchful and thankful. And pray for us too that God may open a door for our message." Colossians 4:2 (NIV)

At the heart of all true prayer is a personal relationship with God. Often the difficulties of life are what God uses to test and refine that relationship. This has been the experience of our congregation since December last year as we have struggled with the reality of our pastor's illness (myeloma) and the uncertain future it has brought with it. This challenge, while not without its pain, is also able to stretch our prayer and increase our dependence on God. Sometimes this is an unseen effect, sometimes it is visible and outward. For example, on May 16 at Nightchurch, many of those present responded to the invitation to come to the front to pray for and lay hands on Rod and Liz, Kerryn and Natalie (Tanya was at Amata, SA). It was a moment of God-given encouragement – none of us present knew that a few days later Rod would begin his first chemotherapy treatment, five weeks earlier than originally planned.

God is wanting to renew our prayer but he is also inviting us to see how he is doing something new in our community. God's surprising grace has opened doors for Rod and others to share in potentially life-changing conversations with people at Possums and elsewhere. Let us not miss this amazing opportunity to pray for the coming of the Kingdom in our midst.

Tuesday prayer breakfast @ 7am

Up to 12 of us have met for prayer each Tuesday morning in the Velvet Lounge. We pray for half an hour then enjoy breakfast together. A sincere thank you to Deirdre Willis for cooking the porridge in winter and generally looking after our needs. Since mid-May, Rod has been unable to attend



due to treatment for the myeloma and we have missed his leadership. We are grateful that Ken Lyall continues to come and inspire us with his Bible readings, usually taken from The Message paraphrase. Steph Bowers, James Docking, Amy Hill and Andy Hunter attend the prayer breakfast prior to their weekly Interns' meeting with Rod, and add a lot of life and vitality to the group and also keep us up to date with news of the Student Res and the NightChurch community. Our prayers focus on the needs of the world, our church community, including prayer for those serving God in distant places, and our own concerns. PASTORAL CARE

The leaders of all the small groups which meet weekly or fortnightly also maintain contact with folk, providing care if necessary. The Interns and other leaders in the NightChurch community are trying to ensure that one of them keeps in touch with those from that congregation who are not participating in small groups.

It has been inspirational to see the way Rod has continued to offer pastoral care to people through phone calls, emails, notes and personal contact during the time he has been receiving treatment for Myeloma.

The spirit of love and caring within KBC is very encouraging and much appreciated by all.


MEMBERSHIP AND PARTICIPATION

The trend in numbers of members and active participants in KBC is once again encouraging. And we are grateful that the numerical growth is accompanied by spiritual development as a community and for many individuals within it.

In our recent discussions about Covenant and being a Covenant Community based on God's grace, the topic of membership has also arisen. This raises questions about the intent and meaning of membership, and its outworking in the present climate. I believe there is good reason for us to look carefully at some of the ways we think about Church membership.

- There are many people who are highly committed to God, our church and ministry who have chosen not to become "members".
- There are some who are "members" but who have chosen

"citizenship" of a country. This situation is not unique to KBC; most churches face the same dynamics. There seems to be a widely held perception that becoming a church member means joining an "institution" and, not surprisingly, that

The traditional membership model may not be adequate in today's setting and we might consider what adjustments may be needed. Possibly it is about changing perceptions; that is, having people see that joining the church means joining not an institution but a covenant community, committed to God, each other and the purposes to which we are called. Or maybe there is a need for us also to make some changes to our processes. I would encourage ongoing discussion about these matters in the coming year.

In bringing this report, we note the passing during this year of Agnes Taylor, Ern Smithson, Nance Stewart and Winsome Abbott, and give thanks for their lives.

SMALL GROUPS

For many people in our Church small groups are vitally important in their ongoing journey of faith, as places of learning, sharing and prayer. I asked a cross-section of the KBC community what they liked about their small group and these are the answers I received:

- I am joyful and feel encouraged to see these young people who are really seeking God, really wanting to know Him and walk in His ways, passionate people. In our group we usually go around saying our prayer/praise requests—almost everyone has something to say, and the things shared are both challenging and encouraging.
- The thing I love about a home group is being able to meet with other Christians and just talk about God. I don't mind when we go off the topic a bit—I just love the conversation and being able to share with people my age about how good God is.
- I've enjoyed the opportunity to explore various spiritual disciplines, to share my thoughts, and to be encouraged and challenged as I hear other members of the group recount their experiences.
- The things I like best about small group are that I can study the Bible, worship the Lord, and form relationships with others in the group.
- I have really valued being part of a small group this year and the opportunity of getting to know new people. I have particularly enjoyed our current study on Guidance and God's will. It's been a great topic for discussing how God guides his people and how to trust him whatever our daily circumstances.
- I'm enjoying the Psalms small group because the Bible studies have given me new insights into this book. I like small group because I tend to be an introvert and feel comfortable praying in my small group. In contrast I wouldn't feel comfortable praying at NightChurch because of the large number of people there.
- I'm enjoying the Romans small group because of the cohesion of the group and the great leadership. Comfort in the group is achieved so readily and easily which is fantastic as well. I love the fact that everyone gets to share and give varying interpretations of the chapter being read.
- Small group has provided a great forum for discussion. It's fantastic to study with people who think so differently and yet approach the study with a heart for God. We can agree whole-heartedly or disagree passionately and still chat over a cuppa knowing no one has taken offence.
- Our study group has become dearer to us as it brings us closer to God and to each other.

In first term in 2009, our whole church community studied the gospel of Luke (ch 4–12) through the sermons which Rod Pell preached in the morning and at NightChurch and through the weekly study groups; a total of 150 people were involved in 17 groups. Most groups were a mix of ages and this facilitated both learning and people getting to know others.

In second term, Ken Manley did a series on the book of Philippians in the morning services and he also wrote a study booklet for groups. Eight small groups (some a mix of ages and others with people of similar ages) used this material to study Philippians.

There were four other groups catering for different interests and needs:

- A Christian Response to Global Poverty, a study developed by Baptist World Aid;
- Sharing your Faith, using Matthias Media material, Six Steps to Talking About Jesus,
- Introducing God a DVD series (similar to Alpha);
- Mums' Group, using KYB material on Mark's gospel.

In all, over 100 people were involved in groups during second term. The biggest group was the "Introducing God" group attended by 15-20 Student Res people each week.

This term, most of the groups which studied Philippians have continued but have chosen a variety of study materials. The Mums' group has taken a term off as it has been hard to get a regular number of mums together each week to make the group viable. A significant development this year has been the groups for young workers, a mix of young marrieds and singles plus a few older people. There are now three such groups – one group is studying Acts (*Ignition*), another Faith and Guidance and the third group Spiritual Disciplines. Groups for Uni students, which include many students from the Res, continue to thrive. This term there is a group studying Romans, another group Faith and Culture and a third group Living Visionary Lives. Three evening groups—Psalms, "Breathing New Life" and "Neglected Voices' (a study of minor Biblical characters)—and a daytime group (Ephesians) for older people continue to be well supported. A number of young adults continue to have a ministry-focussed small group—Friendship in the Flats—in which they visit the high rise flats in Fitzroy each Wednesday night, distributing bread, chatting with people and running activities for children. In total, in term 3 around 110 people are involved in all these different groups.

This year another important aspect of the small group ministry has been the involvement of many small groups in the leading of morning services. This idea originated at the Deacons' Retreat in January. It has helped involve people who would not normally take an upfront role, got groups working together on a project and injected fresh life into our worship (reflecting the statement which appears in our bulletin each week, "we are all ministers of the church"). One visitor commented that it was a wonderful thing that so many members of the congregation were involved in leading services! There have been a few hiccoughs but overall I feel it has been very beneficial and blessed of God. Many thanks to Grace Munro for working with the groups in co-ordinating the morning services.

My sincere thanks also to all who host or lead a small group – it is a vital ministry you are involved in and well worth the time and effort.

If you are not in a small group but would like to be, please see me. Groups meet at different times and study various topics so hopefully there is a group suitable for you.

PREACHING CLASS

Preaching class is open to anyone within the Kew Baptist Church community who feels they may have the gift of preaching, and who would like to learn more about this gift and have the opportunity to test it within a nurturing and edifying environment. It comprises both prescribed teaching by way of handouts and reflective questions, and informal teaching, discussion and prayer.

Under the extraordinary pastoral leadership of Rod Pell and, more recently, Ken Manley, and assisted by Grace Munro and Liz Taylor, the class meets weekly during a series that runs for several months. In the initial meetings, topics such as the character and role of a preacher, preparing a talk, and the pragmatics of talk delivery in terms of speech and presentation are discussed. The group then conducts an exposition of a book or passage of Scripture, which constitutes a 'series'. All those who feel comfortable doing so are invited to contribute a talk to the series and to present this at NightChurch. Class time is divided between listening to and offering suggestions for talk preparations, providing feedback after each presentation, and praying for each other, the series, and our community.

This year in April, the series was led by Ken Manley and was titled 'All who have ears ...'. It explored the seven letters John wrote to the churches, in Revelation chapters 2 and 3. The group as a collective agreed that these letters have spiritual, scriptural, and practical relevance for the church today. Ken introduced the series, giving a context for the seven letters and the historical significance of these scriptures. Each speaker explored a single letter, specifically addressing the spiritual condition of the church to which the letter was addressed, considering its message for the present-day church. Some of the themes presented included the forsaking of our first love, Jesus; the importance of seeking and living in truth; and how to be spiritually alive.

The pulpit is a privileged position and for a church leadership team to be willing to entrust it to members of the congregation is something to be truly honoured. On behalf of the Preaching Class, I would like to sincerely thank Rod, Ken, Grace and Liz for inviting us to walk in what we believe may be our gifting and for generously encouraging, sharpening, and exhorting us in this.

MINISTRY TO THE COMMUNITY AND THE WORLD

KEW STUDENT RESIDENCE

It's exciting to look back on all that has happened in the past twelve months and see the many ways in which God has worked. There was a smooth transition last July with the de Paivas leaving and the Dukes moving in. It was great that Chris could spend a few days with Dukey going through some of the details of running the Res.

Despite a couple of students leaving mid-year in 2008, we managed to fill their places, so had a full house for the whole year. This has again been the case in 2009. We acknowledge God's provision in the students who are currently living at the Res. There is a sizeable group of committed Christians who have been positive leaders and influences on other students. The sense of community and belonging is evident and it is exciting to see the way relationships between students, students and House, and students & staff deepen.

Because we have had a full house for a couple of years, it has meant we have been able to carry out some significant maintenance. In the past twelve months the entire external of the building has been painted, old side upstairs bathroom fixed with new showers and floors, the disabled toilet re-clad, heating re-zoned, improved and serviced, insulation installed, fire alarms hard-wired and new panels installed, reguttering and re-roofing as necessary, slate roof repairs, decking at managers' residence, balustrades on new wing replaced, solar panels installed, creation of the study room (and it is well used), car park garden revamped, as well as re-flooring, re-stumping, installing heating and insulation at The Highbury Grv House. There are plans to install a solar hot water service and water tanks in the near future. While costly, this work means a safer and more comfortable environment for all who live here.

The 'Spring Racing' formal last October was a fantastic event. Reflecting on the year through stories and photographs made it clear to see that it had been and full and fun year. A second footy match was held in October between Res and ex-Res, and the mixed netball teams continued. The Res Olympics, held in August, were definitely a highlight.

The end of year service in November 08 went well and the barbeque in the park was a wonderful opportunity to enjoy each other's company, say thanks and give Kris Kringle gifts. Sadly, at the end of the year we farewelled Amy Hill from her support staff role. It's impossible to express in words the impact Amy has had on the many students she's worked with over the past four years. POSSUMS PLAYGROUPS AND KINDERGARTEN

It has recently been the time for school reports. This often triggers conversations at Possums amongst those with children at school. Occasionally, I have even been privileged to share a good report with a proud parent. Discussion can be very wide ranging. An overriding theme this year was whether the child's results reflected the effort that had been expended. Did the teacher's assessment of the child's effort match that of the parent or even the child itself? Overall, it appeared that the actual result was less important than having that effort box ticked at one hundred percent. It's like that with Christian ministry: we often don't see the results we expect or like, but that doesn't mean that we are to discount our efforts or put in less than a hundred percent, and there is always room for improvement.

The effort involved in maintaining Possums is considerable. Being a Kew Baptist Church ministry it has Christian parameters that we try to work within, and being a community resource we have regulations that we must meet. The integration of these two aspects is what makes Possums special. How are we doing at Possums? If a measurement of success is numbers attending, then we are doing well, with close to capacity enrolments. However, in ministry, numbers aren't everything and some of our hopes and aspirations are less easy to measure. As in all things, though, more time and effort working towards our goals and objectives can only help. We have two groups of people who are definitely putting in one hundred percent. They are the Possums Committee (including David Benwell, Ray Leigh and Deirdre Willis from KBC), who do a marvellous job looking after the day to day, week by week operation of Possums, and the Possums Ministry Support Team (Jenny Clark, Ray Leigh, Anastasia Panagiotidis, Rod Pell, Ann Seeley, Carol Warner and Deirdre Willis), who look at the bigger picture of mission and represent the Kew Baptist Church ministry aspect.

Jenny Clark comes to Possums on a Thursday morning and she has agreed to share some of her thoughts with us. She writes:

"When I was approached by a member of Possums Committee, asking if I would like to be involved as a helper, I was reluctant. Due to the fact my grandchildren had attended and loved going to Possums and also my admiration for Miriam and her leadership, I decided to do a term. That term became a year and now over three years later, I realise my involvement has become an important part of my commitment to God.

Times spent with Possums families, mums and dads, grandparents, nannies, has become very special....making new friends, lending a listening ear, helping to mind siblings, offering encouragement and support. We watch newborns arrive, nurse and care for them, then all of a sudden those babies are joining in, being part of the activities.

We all become involved together in all activities, whether it be preparing fruit platters, cleaning, music time, craft or outdoor play.

The children and families all become our friends. We miss each other if any are absent, or when it is holiday time.

At times I have been asked to pray for family situations. God gives me many opportunities to share my faith and trust in God and tell of my involvement in our church life here at Kew."

Having some time away this year, I especially appreciated the stability that the church helpers provide for their groups. Having Bec Rugers, who is one of our Possums mums, take on the teaching position was also a blessing as it meant that there was no disruption to the program or attendees.

To everyone who contributed to Possums over the past twelve months in any way at all, thank you. All efforts are appreciated and valued and mostly don't go unnoticed. CHAT AND CHEW

Chat and Chew was started in February 2003 and has met on the last Thursday of the month from February to November, that is, ten times each year. Lunch starts soon after noon followed by the program, concluding no later than 2pm.

The aim of Chat and Chew has been to provide friendship for older men, early retirees and the unemployed.

Today, Chat and Chew meets at Karana where the catering is done by the kitchen staff, and Felicity Rentos coordinates the workers who set up the community centre and the carers who see that assistance is given to those who have limited mobility.

Of more recent times, in spite of considerable 'drop outs' due to deaths and changed circumstances, numbers attending have increased to about 30 including a good representation from the independent living apartments at Karana.

A varied program is offered, including community singing led by Brian Garth and David Mynard, interesting speakers on a variety of subjects, and appropriate visual displays.

Many expressions of appreciation have been received for different aspects of the programs, including the inherent encouragement to accept and live the Christian life.

God's blessing is evident, and all members of the Chat and Chew team are appreciated.

MISSION, AID AND DEVELOPMENT GROUP

Meeting about every two months, this group provides one venue amongst several for us to share recent experiences with others who have a heart for action arising from social justice concerns and a desire to share the faith.

Time is spent in prayer for the speakers and for others from Kew BC working in cross-cultural ministries in Australia and overseas. In addition, between Sept 08 and Sept 09, post cards were written to many, including Aidan, John and Janine Barclay, Peter and Sue Bird (Sarah's parents), Lisa Detlefsen, John and Margaret Docking (James and Thomas' parents), Thomas Docking, Russel Dyer, David and Eryl Edwards, Bonnie Miller, Tanya Pell, Michelle Stancliffe, Tin and Anh Van Pham and Sarah Vosti.

October 08: Laura Bracken, Niru Ramasamy and Anna Muston

• Laura, Niru and Anna showed slides and talked of their trip to visit rubbish dumps in the Philippines, in order to document, on film, the lives of people who live as squatter communities and scavengers on and around these dumpsites. The girls were able to visit and see the work of organisations such as Samaritana in Manila, engaged in sharing and living out the Gospel among Filipino women caught in prostitution, and Cornerstone House, an orphanage for 18 boys (former street kids) on Cebu Island.

November 08: Amy Hill and Michelle Edwards

- Amy reported on plans to move to the Collingwood/Abbotsford area, with Laura Bracken and Katie
 Ward, as a different form of outreach to people in that area, offering friendship, not charity. A team
 of young adults from Kew BC has been visiting the high-rise flats every Wednesday evening for
 many months, offering friendship and a range of after-school activities to children and families who
 live there.
- **Michelle** shared her plans to attend the Asia Regional Conference in Manila, in January, of the International Christian Alliance on Prostitution.

February 09: Michelle Edwards and Russel Dyer

- **Michelle** reported on the various intense activities of the conference she had attended, including training in counselling, panel workshops, networking and learning of the shocking extent of human trafficking in the Asia-Pacific region.
- **Russel** talked of his year teaching English and sport at the International School in Yemen. Russel expressed thanks for prayer during his time away, also gratitude to God for the provision of finances and career opportunities that had opened up after his arrival. He had roomed with Josh Power (formerly of Kew BC) in the old part of the capital, Sanaa.

March 09: Bonnie Miller and Janine Barclay

Bonnie showed slides and spoke about her six months in Cambodia, assisting in a number of ways
with the running of Hope International School, which was established in 2002 by her parents. She
spoke of the many challenges of cross-cultural work of this kind, and of what she had learned of
patience, trust, and reliance upon God.





Children, made in God's image and precious to him, living in the squalor of rubbish dumps in the Philippines, as pictured; the horror of being trafficked and forced into addiction and child prostitution with resultant HIV/AIDS; the terror of fleeing from conflict and war as refugees; the sadness of homelessness in Melbourne. KBC, with the MAD group, plays a small part in shining God's light into the lives of children and adults such as these.

• **Janine Barclay** spoke briefly of the plans she and John had for returning to India for a further six months, for John to assist the new Principal of Hebron International School to settle in and learn the ropes, for Janine to continue her role as Third Culture Kids (TCK) Advisor, and both to act as dorm parents in the boarding school. Janine's job will require her to find and train regional TCK advisors. Beyond that, they were unsure what God had for them in 2010.

June 09: James Docking and Amy, Laura, Jazlyn and Katie at Stanton Street

The MAD Group met on this occasion at 19 Stanton Street, Abbotsford, and shared a meal with Amy Hill, Laura Bracken, Jazlyn Langford and Katie Ward. It was a chance to catch up with what they were each doing and how relationships were developing between them and others in the local community. In addition, James Docking reported on his parents' recent move to Jinja, a town in Uganda, where they had plans to stay and work for at least two years, his father (a plumber) as an instructor of youth in the trade school, and his mother as a midwife at the local clinic.

August 09: Emily Hanscamp

Emily had just returned from a month as a volunteer intern with a Women's Collective working in a red-light district of Mumbai in India. Everything about her experience was deeply shocking and confronting – the gigantic numbers of women involved in prostitution (7.5 million in India), 50% being minors, and the vast majority having been stolen from their families at a very early age by the deception of people-traffickers; the appalling abuse and neglect of the girls and women by those who controlled them; the powerlessness of the victims to escape their lives of slavery and misery. Despite all these negatives, the Women's Collective and the Oasis organisation that Emily visited offered glimmers of hope, reaching out to the women with medical aid, emotional support, education for children born to the women, vocational training, and micro-credit. Under-staffed and under-funded, these organisations attempt to make a difference, and there were links with a number of churches who also sent workers into the brothels. Some rare stories of success gave hope. Emily reported overwhelming feelings of grief and sorrow after her return to Melbourne, and much prayer and soul-searching, to process her experiences and seek a direction for the future.

Good Grub is held at the Kew Uniting Church Hall in Highbury Grove. Every Tuesday, a hot meal is provided for about 50 lonely, disadvantaged folk in our area and they receive a warm welcome and have the opportunity for social interaction.









ABBOTSFORD HOUSE

Household Aims:

- Immerse ourselves in the neighbourhood and community of Collingwood/Abbotsford.
- Become a local, understand what its like to live in the area, connect.
- Commit to serving our neighbours, living hospitably, openly sharing life with those we come into contact with.
- Commit to praying together as a household and having an open house that is always warm and inviting to others.
- Provide friendship, not charity!
- Connect people to one another (Nightchurch/Student Res/Collingwood community), share God's love through example, action and friendship.
- Learn from the experience and hardships of others and be stretched in our understanding and perception of God.
- Find out what God is already doing in this area and join Him in that.

Looking over these points as a household we feel we are beginning to touch the surface of these aims. We recognise that becoming a 'local' takes time and involvement in many facets of a community. With commitments to work, study and existing commitments Kew community, time is sometimes a challenge. The following examples are some of the ways we feel we have been able to begin to connect with the Collingwood/Abbotsford community.

- Connecting with some members from the local church (St Martins/Concern Australia) and some of their ministries. Jazlyn has headed up *Livewires*, sharing computer skills, laughing, and learning literacy skills with primary students from the Collingwood Housing estate.
- Being regular visitors to Lentil as Anything and forming relationships in the Abbotsford Convent community. Laura is particularly committed to making connections between local people and the refugees and asylum seekers that Lentil as Anything support (many are clients with whom Amy works).
- Local primary schools. Jazlyn has had the opportunity to pour into Collingwood kids through relief teaching, connecting to the community with parents through their children.
- Amy has had more opportunity to meet students at the Collingwood language centres for both secondary school age and young adult newly arrived young people. Amy's work at Spectrum Migrant Resource Centre has allowed her to submit a grant application for a 'girls only' youth group in the Youth Space below the Collingwood Housing Estate, she is eagerly awaiting the results of that!



- We have focused on hospitality, our home being a safe haven and a place for others to come to and share in. Katie is our amazing resident 'home maker' and chef extraordinaire!
- Forming relationships with some of our neighbours, eating meals with them, attending their parties, having them over to ours.

We are so appreciative of the prayer, support and interest from all at Kew Baptist and are thankful to God for His provision and the many life lessons he is teaching us daily, as individuals and a house. We are excited about what the new year holds, as we seek to live for Him in this community.

WIDER CONNECTIONS

Interaction with the wider community of God's people enriches our church and enhances our capacity for service.

The **Baptist Union of Victoria** is the administrative body that links Victorian Baptists Churches together and keeps us informed of the wider fellowship of believers. They inform us of new outreach opportunities, offer the counsel of Regional Superintendents and provide training seminars in many fields. Twice a year the BUV invites church representatives to gather in praise and worship together, with a rich time of sharing, and to participate in the decision-making processes of the Union. As the Incorporated Body, they hold the titles of Baptist Church properties. They are located in offices in Hartwell on Burwood Highway, and are led by Rev. Alan Marr, the Director of Ministries.

Our membership in the Baptist Union of Victoria provides our links in turn with the Baptist Union of Australia and the Baptist World Alliance (BWA).

BWA is the worldwide body holding nearly 200 Unions and Associations together, so that unitedly we might participate in world need, when required. A BWA World Congress is held every five years, when delegates from all over the world gather – in 2010 it is in Hawaii (interested in sun and surf!?). They hold many other Conferences from time to time. Our own Rev. Dr. Ken Manley is active as member of a study commission of the BWA (he occasionally needs someone to carry his bags for him!). Gifted Baptist leaders and preachers deliver many helpful and challenging addresses, to be shared by all.

In the local Kew area, we are represented in the Kew Inter Church Council (KICC) and Kew Ministers' group. Two or three times a year Ministers and delegates meet, rotating among our Churches, to discuss ways we might be able to work together effectively in the Community. The meeting brings together Roman Catholic, Anglican, Uniting Church and Baptist fellowships. In recent years, the group has organised the annual Carols by Candlelight event and participation in the Kew Festival Parade. Grants are made KICC from time to time by Booroondara Council to assist with the Carols service.

One of the most inspiring activities is the Inter Church Service in the Carmelite Monastery in Stevenson Street Kew. This takes place at the end of the Kew Festival, and is run by the Carmelite order, with the ministers of Kew invited to participate.

MINISTRY SUPPORT

CHURCH ADMINISTRATOR

The administrative, financial and property functions of the office may be important—but only because they help keep the wheels turning in the wider life and ministries of the church. It is that broader view which gives perspective to what fills each day in the church office.

KBC's year took an unexpected turn when Rod Pell was diagnosed with Myeloma at the end of 2008, and then began chemotherapy in late May 2009. We have been impressed with the way Rod, Liz, Kerryn, Tanya and Natalie have coped, and their faith has been inspiring and challenging.

One question we as a church community might ask at this time is, *What does God want to teach us in this situation?* And there may be several answers to this question.

One response relates to the present relatively healthy state of the church. In the past ten years under Rod's leadership we have seen numerical and spiritual growth, and many people using and developing their God-given gifts within the church and in the wider community. It may be helpful to identify some of the patterns of ministry which have been used by God so effectively. Clearly these patterns are strongly evident in Rod's style, but also in that of others, and under Christ's headship and Rod's guidance, it is a team effort.

- **Mutual care** we see this in Rod's endless phone calls and conversations, the Interns' follow-up of young adults, the pastoral care/hospitality group who keep in touch regularly with people, and the many individuals who offer care in informal but effective ways.
- **An inward/outward balance**: Much effort goes into nurturing the church community, but there are also exciting and effective outreach initiatives, some through "church" programs such as Possums Playgroups, the Student Residence, the allocation of 12% of our offering income to mission, aid and development projects and more; and some in personal or group initiatives such as Friendship in the Flats visits to refugees and immigrants in Fitzroy, Andy Mitchell's facilitation of a small group for Students at The Res, the Abbotsford House occupants' links in the Collingwood area, Andy Hunter's and James Docking's interaction with exchange students at Swinburne, the visits of young adults to cross-cultural mission situations, and much more. Again, these are just samples.
- **Lifestyles which attempt to take seriously Gospel values and priorities**: this is evident in people as diverse as Eugene Veith and some young adults who constantly think about what it means to be a disciple of Jesus and for whom this is a priority.
- The use and strengthening of God-given gifts: the diversity of abilities God has given this church is quite remarkable. The internship program has been very effective for the individuals involved and for the church. The initiative early in 2009 of inviting small groups to lead Sunday morning worship has been helpful to the groups as well as the congregation. The preaching class has nurtured some amazing God-given gifts. And there is so much more as people give themselves to God for him to work through them.
- **Networking, team ministries and small groups**: although there are still individuals and families on the fringes of church life, we are blessed that so many people feel well connected and supported, especially at times of difficulty or illness. The mutual care, teaching and prayer are important aspects of study, prayer and ministry groups, and in turn these clusters strengthen the whole church. There is also much informal networking which goes on.
- Commitment and consistency a core group of people are extremely reliable in their attendance at worship services and in their ministry responsibilities. We see this in many of our friends whose consistency has impacted the church for years even though their strength has now begun to fail with age. We see it also in others of all ages and in diverse forms of involvement we could name just a handful as examples: Deirdre Willis, Steve and Liz Taylor in several ministry areas; Dave McKeown and Christine Muller with the Carrical BBQs, John Hollow with the audio recordings; Natalie Pell in mowing the church lawns; Luke Gibbons and Steph Bowers with the youth groups. For some people, this consistency of attendance is not easy some because of heavy work responsibilities, some due to having partners who do not see church as a priority, others due to family concerns. Let us not underestimate the benefit of consistency not just for our own growth, but also for the others in our church or group.

As Bill Leng pointed out, we are a community of faith, but at an even more fundamental level, a community based on God's grace, and for that reason we can have a quiet confidence as we move forward, even though none of us know what that future will hold for us.

In the office itself, this year has gone relatively smoothly despite the major change of Rod not being present as much since May.

We have introduced a few changes, such as the increased use of the email for distribution of prayer news and some adaptations to the content of the bulletin. I would love to have feedback about these and other changes, or ideas which might enhance further the ministry from the office.

At around the time Rod began treatment, someone stole the office computer and, after a few weeks of not having a fully functioning computer, I am grateful to George Dullege for sorting that out.

After six years helping Bev Smith with counting the offering, Audrey Bennett decided it was time to hand over to someone else, and Anastasia Panagiotidis has stepped in. Robyn Scott, who came regularly to tidy the church and do photocopying, felt it was time to move on from KBC, and now Deirdre Willis does some of this, while Natalie Pell continues to empty the bins and Karen Lim folds the bulletin for us. We appreciate the contribution of each of these people. I am also grateful to the residents of The House next door, who without complaint help with various tasks—often when there is some heavy lifting to be done.

PROPERTY MAINTENANCE

It is obvious to all that we are bringing the property up to acceptable standards and a better appearance, and we are grateful for the provision of some legacies and other gifts which are enabling this work to proceed.

The two external tile areas at the church look really good and the re-fit of the hall toilets is finalised. The hall painting is now complete and work on the external painted areas of the church is proceeding. Lighting has been improved and plumbing needs have been addressed. Insurance payments helped cover the cost of replacing the computer stolen from the church office. Broken glass areas have been replaced.

Possums Playgroups have done a lot of work upgrading the playground area at the hall and we are grateful for their contribution.

The manse needs two new security doors powder-coated to a matching colour.

The church internal porch is to be refurbished to allow Mums with babies to attend to their needs, yet still hear and see the service through proposed glass doors. We are awaiting some funds to do this. We are also planning to replace the two sets of church front doors, and make them more friendly to visitors. Again we need funding for this project. The side path on the northern side of the church (house side) needs a complete rebuild as it is not a safe surface to walk on. If you feel you can help, we would love to hear from you.

AUDIO AND DATA GROUPS

The Audio and Data (audio-visual) groups are volunteers who operate:

- the sound desk, providing
 - o public address amplifiers from the various microphones,
 - o audio-recordings of the services, and the hearing-aid loop
- the data projector and screen at the front of the Church, providing:
 - o video images of songs, photos and movies.

For NightChurch, there is a group of over 20 who can "drive" the equipment, with a rotation roster of five people for audio and another five for data. Andy Hunter is the organiser for the NightChurch audio and data teams. The operation works quite effectively.

For the Sunday morning service, the team is smaller, being around five or six in total. Richard Marshall joined the team early this year. His willingness and diligence weekly (doing preparatory setup of the equipment in the $\frac{1}{2}$ to 1 hour before the service) has significantly reduced the stress on other teammembers, and helped increase reliability of the presentations.

One notable event was the Billy Graham Memories service and afternoon (21 Jun 2009) – this took some weeks of technical preparation (with lots of video clips to be edited). The preparation paid off with the presentation proceeding smoothly and appreciated by many.

Over the past year or so, we have developed our weekly audio recordings of services in "MP3" format. The recordings are distributed within days to folk who want them (often because they cannot attend the service). Typically, six to eight folk regularly receive these weekly recordings, and they are very appreciative of them.

For team-members, knowledge of the process and equipment is interesting, and is a rewarding (and challenging) contribution to Church-life, with Church services clearly depending on their valued contribution. Presenters and organisers of the service can help us with early notification of what is coming up, giving us a chance to setup the equipment (eg screen and projector, say a 10 minute job) and to check/adjust the compatibility of DVDs and computer-files with the computer (never a foregone conclusion, and taking anywhere from two minutes to an hour or so). Overall, more long-term work needs to be done, including training team-members, equipment maintenance and development, and communication/integration with other groups in the Church.

FINANCES

It has been most encouraging to see the way in which the church responded to the financial challenges we faced for the last financial year.

As shown in the Income and Expenditure report, our offerings for the year were \$234,044 (compared to the budget of \$215,000); this was very pleasing and helped in achieving a surplus for the year of \$32,445. Some large donations were received, including a bequest of \$62,625 from the estate of Stephen Kidner. Stephen's generosity is much appreciated.

Importantly these results mean that the church has a much improved position from which it can operate in the future.
